Introduction

The Museo di scultura antica Giovanni Barracco preserves the rich collection of comparative ancient sculpture assembled by Giovanni Barracco and donated by him to the municipality of Rome in 1902. The museum was inaugurated in 1905 in a building that Barracco had Gaetano Koch design for this purpose; this building was demolished in 1938. After being moved to the storerooms of the Musei Capitolini, in 1948 the collection was finally installed in its current location in the so-called “Farnesina ai Baullari”. The collection contains two sculptures of Mesoamerican origin.

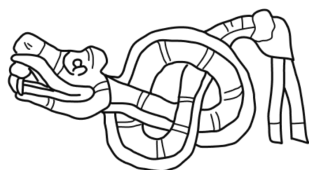

<i>Ethnic group / community / cultural context</i>	Teotihuacan (Mexico) Huastec (Mexico)
<i>Description of the Collection</i>	The collection contains two Mesoamerican sculptures. One is a Teotihuacan mask in dark serpentine representing a frontal human face, with a band-shaped headdress running horizontally across the forehead. The other is a Huastec female sandstone figure representing a woman in frontal position, with her hands joined at the belt and her breasts bare. She wears the typical conical headdress with a pleated “fan” at the back. The legs are broken just below the lower edge of the skirt.
<i>History of the collection</i>	It is not known how Giovanni Barracco acquired the two sculptures, which were probably bought on the antiquarian market.
